Answering your questions about Alberta's Coal Policy



What is coal used for?

There are two main types of coal in Alberta:

- 1 Thermal coal is used for electricity and is typically found outside of mountain areas. An example of this is the Highvale Coal Mine near Lake Wabamun.
- 2 Metallurgical coal is used to produce steel. It is mostly found in Alberta's Eastern Slopes and the Rockies.

What is the Alberta Coal Policy (1976)?

- Encouraged coal development which considered the environment, the economy, and the labour force
- Designated areas where coal exploration and development is viable and places where it should be more limited
- Four Categories were established regarding coal leasing, exploration, and development

What are the **Coal Categories?**

Category 1: No coal mining or development is allowed — Federal or Provincial Parks, Wilderness Areas, Wildlife Sanctuaries. Designated Recreational Areas, etc

Category 2: Coal surface mining is not allowed, with exceptions


— Parts of southern Rockies and Foothills

Category 3: Coal development can be considered

 Northern forests and eastern part of Eastern Slopes

Category 4: Coal development is permitted — Parts of land not otherwise covered

What has changed?

June 1, 2020 → The 1976 Coal Policy was rescinded, which meant:

- The province indicated the coal categories were no longer required due to improved energy policies and planning processes
- All restrictions on new coal leases from categories 2 and 3 were removed, but Category 1 lands still would not allow mining To read the May 15, 2020 Alberta Government press release, click here.

February 8, 2021 → The 1976 Coal Policy was reinstated by Alberta Energy in order to:

- Reconsider the coal categories and the processes related to coal development and exploration
- Engage the public regarding coal exploration applications on Category 2 lands
- Confirm that coal approvals recognize constraints on surface mining in Category 2 lands and do not involve mountain top removal
- New coal exploration approvals on Category 2 lands are paused until further consultations on a new coal policy To read the February 8, 2021 Alberta Government press release, click here.

- The government opened public consultation on March 29, 2021
- Consultation will be led by a Coal Policy Committee of five members from various sectors
- The Committee will provide a report on what they heard from Albertans in the Fall of 2021
